This letter is my last newsletter greeting to you as your President. I've enjoyed my term very much and must confess to having mixed feelings about its coming to an end. I am happy that I still have a few more opportunities to chat with you via our weekly e-news announcements. I've enjoyed the opportunities that I've had this year to

meet more of the Club's wonderful members. If you would like to see what the Club has accomplished during this year, I encourage you to go to our website, click on "Board," and scroll down to the links that will allow you to read the minutes of our meetings.

Another "last": This year, we moved from four printed newsletters to one printed one and three digital editions. However, this digital edition of our newsletter will be the last one. Here are the reasons for this decision. While print limited the size of our newsletters, digital newsletters could be (and were) expanded exponentially. There are three consequences to increasing size. First, the task of putting these newsletters together became more complicated than you might imagine. Second, by the time that all the work that needed to be done was done, the "news" in the newsletter was no longer timely. Third, it became difficult to mount these larger newsletters on our website.

As a result, the Club Communications team, with the approval of the Board, have determined that we would be better served to rely for our news on our weekly e-news bulletins, occasional Special Messages from the President, and our Facebook page, supplemented by quarterly mailings with reservation forms for events, membership renewal forms, and other messages. Photographs and interest-group posts will be found on our Facebook page, as will announcements and information about events. These various options will allow us to get the news to you quickly, when you need to see it. To ensure that this new system doesn't leave anyone out, I urge any of you who know people who don't regularly use email to share our electronic communications with them, and perhaps to introduce them to our Facebook page.

I may have mentioned that the first thing I did when I came to the University of Illinois was to join the Illinois Club, and I want to thank you all for supporting the Club and me.

SCHOLARSHIP AWARD WINNERS

JUDITH LIFE IKENBERRY FINE ARTS AWARD – \$3,600 Kelsey Grotkiewicz
